- A laurel, 15 ins. diam., bears S.18°E., 45 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 24 B T.
Asc. 490 ft. on general N. slope.
- 48.00 Leave burn, enter heavy timber, bears NW. and SE.
- 52.68 Creek, 4 lks. wide, C. NW.
- 81.46 Creek, 3 lks. wide, C. NW.
- 82.53 The cor. of secs. 23 and 26 only.
Land, mountainous.
Soil, clay loam and stony, second and third rate.
Timber, fir, cedar.
Undergrowth, vine maple, hazel.
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- From the cor. of secs. 13, 14, 23 and 24.
East, on a random line, bet. secs. 13 and 24.
- 40.00 Set temp. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.
- 80.40 Intersect N. and S. line, 5 lks. S. of the old cor. of secs. 13 and 24, established by Deputy Hathorn, hereinbefore described.
Thence
S.89°58'W., on a true line, bet. secs. 13 and 24.
Over mountainous land, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.
Asc. 67 ft. over NE. slope.
- 2.65 Desc. 95 ft.
- 5.78 Creek, 4 lks. wide, C. N.
Asc. 68 ft. to
- 7.72 Spur, slopes N.; desc. 203 ft. on NW. slope.
- 27.28 Left bank of South Fork of South Umpqua River, C. SW.
- 27.78 Right bank of same, thence over bench.
- 36.40 Right bank of South Fork of South Umpqua River, comes from SE., flows W.
- 40.20 The point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. falls in the river.
