for $\frac{1}{2}$ sec. cor. on E. bdy. sec. 36, marked $\frac{1}{2}$ on W. face,
from which,

A Fir, 30 ins. diam. bears S.15*W., 18 lks. dist.
marked $\frac{1}{2}$ S 36 B T.

A Madrone, 20 in. diam. bears N.59*W., 70 lks. dist.
marked $\frac{1}{2}$ S 36 B T.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, clay and stony, third and fourth rate.

Timber, Fir, Hemlock,

Undergrowth, Snow-brush, Madrone, Hazel, Vine-Maple.

Mountainous or heavily timbered land or land covered
with dense undergrowth and exceptionally difficult
to survey, 85.75 chs.

General Description.

This line extended across rough broken country for
the greater portion of its length, the exceptions
being portions of the north boundary of secs. 2, 3,
and 4. The township lying north of this line contains
considerable land suitable for agriculture of the *same*
general character as that appropriated by the settlers
in T. 30 S., R. 2 W.
