	<p>Timber, Fir, Laurel, Ash and Maple.</p> <p>Undergrowth, Hazel and Huckleberry.</p> <p>Shively Creek has growing on its narrow bottom, some splendid Maple and Ash timber, but it empties through a rocky bluff in the Umpqua River, which prevents ready access. The headwaters of this creek contain a good deal of gold, the placer diggings of which have for the present been abandoned.</p>

	Ascending a SE. slope, through Fir timber.	
9.00	Top of rise; begin descent.	+150
20.50	A canyon, course S.80°E.; begin steep ascent.	-60
32.00	Top of ascent; begin descent.	+300
34.15	Same canyon, course N.60°E.; begin steep ascent.	-25
40.00	Set a Laurel post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the ground, for $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S on N. face, from which	
	A Fir, 42 ins. diam., bears S.5°E., 4 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T.	
	A Cedar, 12 ins. diam., bears N.27°E., 9 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T.	
	Keep ascending East slope, through Fir timber.	
59.00	Top of ridge, course N. and S., dividing waters of Shively Creek from those of Beal's Creek.	+600
59.40	A remarkable Fir, 36 ins. diam., standing comparatively alone, was first seen on line from the ridge, 21 chs. W. of Cor. of Tps. 30 and 31 S., Rs. 3 and 4 W.	
	Begin steep descent of a burn.	
74.00	Leave burn; enter green Fir timber.	
80.00	A Fir, 12 ins. diam., is Cor. to Secs. 33, 34, 3 and 4,	-700
