dist., marked T 30 S R 4 W S 25 B T.
 A Laurel, 10 ins. diam., bears N.50*W., 19 lks.
 dist., marked T 30 S R 4 W S 24 B T.
 Var. 19*20'E.

Thence

S.54*42'W., on true line bet. Secs. 24 and 25.

Descending, heavy underbrush.

- 5.50 Enter Oak openings; keep descending a SW. hillside.
- 32.90 County road to Canyonville, course SE. and NW.
- 39.10 Right bank of S. Umpqua River, course NW., bank 20 ft. high. Set flag at Sec. Cor., run base N.35*18'W., 1 ch; Sec. Cor. bears S.45*42'W., making 6.30 chs. across.

- 45.40 The Cor. to Secs. 23, 24, 25 and 26.
 Land, hilly.
 Soil, gravelly loam, underlaid with gold bearing quartz, but which has never been prospected. Only mining for free gold has ever been done there.
 Timber, Oak, Laurel, Fir, Alder and Willow.
 Undergrowth, young Oaks and Laurels and Firs.

 A post is standing in place, probably set by the County Surveyor; also all the bearing trees, to-wit

 A B. Oak, 9 ins. diam., marked S 23 B T.
 A B. Oak, 10 ins. diam., marked S 14 B T.
