Oak, 12 ins. diam., bears N.40*E., 52 lks. dist., marked <math>\frac{1}{4}</math> S B T.</p> <p>A W. Oak, 10 ins. diam., bears S.50*W., 30 lks. dist., marked <math>\frac{1}{4}</math> S B T.</p> <p>Both are the old bearing trees, which I re-mark, the old marks being dim.</p> <p>Thence</p> <p>South, on true line bet. Secs. 22 and 23.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Var. 19*10'E.</p>

9.50	Foot of descent; enter Oak grub; level prairie, bears E.
