

County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

Subdivisions of T. 30 S., R. 4 W.

CHAINS	
35.00	Leave garden; a wagon road bears E. and W.
35.87	Right bank of S. Umpqua river, course W. Set flag here, also flag S.1*20'W. on left bank; cross over, run base S.88*40'E., 1.50 angle to back flag 20*7', making 4.10 chs. across.
39.97	To flag on left bank of river, thence N.1*20'E., 43 lks. to a point 30 lks. S.1*20'W. of true $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor.
39.54	Set a basalt rock 20x6x6 ins. 15 ins. in the ground, marked W C $\frac{1}{4}$ on W. face, from which A B. Oak, 10 ins. diam., bears S.74 $\frac{1}{2}$ *W., 180 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S W C B T. A B. Oak, 30 ins. diam., bears N.73 $\frac{1}{2}$ *E., 316 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S W C B T. The old post and bearing trees are evidently washed away by the river. There is also some mistake in the field notes of original survey, making the left bank 300 chs. N. of $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor., as this is about the distance to the right bank; if he found an Alder as bearing tree to this $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. post, the river could not have been 300 chs. away, as I always find the Alder to grow next to the edge of water.
39.50	County road to Canyonville, course S.70*W.
40.00	Enter field; prairie with a few scattering Oaks.
78.48	The Cor. to Secs. 8, 9, 16 and 17. Land, N. quarter hilly, S. three quarters level. Soil, gravelly loam; N. quarter 3d rate, S. three quarters 2d rate. Timber, Oak, Pine, Laurel and Alder. Undergrowth, Poison Oak, young Oak and Laurel. May 22, 1889.
	Var. 17*40'E.
39.51	East, on a random line between Secs. 4 and 9. $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor. bears S. 36 lks.
79.18	Intersect N. and S. line 79 lks. N. of Cor. to Secs. 3, 4, 9 and 10. Thence N. 89*23'W., on true line between Secs. 4 and 9.
