

County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

Subdivisions of T. 30 S., R 5 W.

CHAINS

Land, mountainous.

Soil, gravelly, 3rd. rate.

Timber, fir, oak, maple, cedar, willow and laurel.

Undergrowth, vine maple, hazel, arrow-wood, small firs
and laurels.

Mountainous or heavily timbered land.

80.00 chains.

N.89°43'E, on a random line bet. Secs. 1 and 12.

40.00 Set temp. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.

78.57 Intersect E. bdy. of T. 303 lks. S. of cor. of Secs.

1, 6, 7 and 12 which is a black oak post $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high,
4 ins. sq. marked with witness as described by the
surveyor general.

I set a fir post, 3 ft. long, 4 ins. sq. 24 ins. in the
ground, for closing corners of Secs. 1 and 12, marked
C C T 30 S R 5 W on W., S 1 on N., and S 12 on S.
faces; with 1 groove on N, and 5 grooves on S. faces,
from which,

A laurel, 7 ins. diam., bears S.22°W, 35 lks. dist.
marked T 30 S R 5 W S 12 B T.

A laurel, 6 ins. diam., bears N.35°W, 45 lks. dist.
marked T 30 S R 5 W S 1 B T.

As these trees are easily killed by fire and no other in
limits, I added:

A pine, 40 ins. diam., bears N.66 $\frac{1}{2}$ °E, 53 lks. dist.
marked T 30 S R 5 W C C S 1 and 12 B T.

All marks relating to secs. 1 and 12 were destroyed on
the old post and bearing trees.

July 18, 1896

Thence I run,

S.89°43'W, on true line bet. secs. 1 and 12.

Steep ascent of a spur, through dense undergrowth of
firs, laurels, hazel, in fir, laurel and oak timber.

4.50 Top of spur, bears SW and NE, 150 ft. above cor. begin
steep descent.
