General Description

The eastern portion of this tp.. contains a large amount of first rate grazing land, also some small valleys along the creeks good for farming.

It is well timbered with the various kinds of Pine, Fir, Cedar, Oak, Laurel, and a few other species. Squatter claims are located in almost every sec. in the two eastern tiers.

Gold is found along the bars of Cow creek in sufficient quantities to justify their being worked.

A very rich copper mine is also discovered in sec. 36. Other minerals are found in the vicinity in greater or lesser quantities.

No reliance can be placed in the needle in this tp. owing to the local attraction often varying several degrees in a few chs.
