General Description of W. Boundary

The W. boundary of this township begins near the north base of the canyon Mts. and runs over high Mountain ridges to about the middle of the canyon range. This country is heavily timbered, principally with fir; some Laurel, Live Oak, Hemlock and Sugar Pine, and a dense undergrowth of Fir, Laurel, Hazel, Oak, Chinquapin, Salal, Raspberry, gooseberry, etc. The waters on this boundary flow NE. into Canyon Creek and SW. into Cow Creek. The entire township lies in the canyon mountains and is totally unfit for settlement.

The canyon mountains run E. & W. and are about 12 miles wide. N. & S. extending from Umpqua Valley on the N. to Cow Creek Valley on the S.
