## South Boundary of Township 31 S., R. 6 W.

This mile runs across the valley of a small stream and terminates on the east slope of a ridge running nearly north from main mountain, lying south.

Land, very rough and broken, unfit for settlement.

Timber, Fir, Laurel, Live Oak, some pine, with undergrowth of same.

Soil, stony and unfit for cultivation.

#### GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF SOUTH AND WEST BOUNDARIES

The south and west boundaries of this tp. lay entirely within the Canon range of mountains, which are totally unfit for settlement. The mountain ridges are very high with steep slopes and many of them, rocky summits. The side for a great part are fine or decayed rock, and too steep to retain much soil on them.

Some of the more oval ridges have some good soil and grass, but are generally inaccessible for domestic animals.

The country is well watered with numerous mountain branches, which find their way into Cow Creek, on the North, west and south. The timber is principally Red Fir, some Pine, Laurel, Live Oak, and Chincapin.

The undergrowth is generally the same with the addition of Hazel and salal. The old pack trail passes through this township from N. to S.
