

General Description.

CHAINS

The greater portion of this township is rough, mountainous and broken. There is however, a number of small vallies along Cow Creek and its tributaries which is susceptible of cultivation. The Township is generally covered with Fir, Pine, Cedar and other varieties of timber. The second class, sugar pine, very valuable for commerce.

There are now no less than seven settlements in various portions of the Township.

The Township should therefore be subdivided.
