GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This Township contains very little 1st class lands- generally hilly or mountainous, 3rd rate. There is however, some narrow bottoms and bench of 1st class lands.

All the N. sides of the hills and mountains are covered with green fir, pine and cedar timber, while the S. sides are more generally open with scattering timbers or covered with a dense growth of generally, young pines, firs & c.

Gold has been found in paying quantities along Middle Creek and some of its tributaries have, however, worked at this time.

Settlements are made by A. Bandel in NW  $\frac{1}{4}$  of S. 1, E. Lewis and 3 other parties in Sec. 9. Two settlers in Sec. 17. Tip Ketching in Sec. 36 and B. Riddle in Sec. 33 and two others in Sec. 32 and Russell in Sec. 35.

The Oregon and California R. R. Co., are just extending their road through secs. 4, 8, 9, 17, 18 and 19.
