GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This Township is chiefly high, mountainous and broken, with an occasional "Bench" Glade or valley, containing small tracts of first-class land, susceptible of cultivation. It is, however, generally more valuable for its timbers, than for agriculture.

The soil is generally red clay, and in most parts very rocky.

The entire Township is densely covered with a fine forest of large timber of the most valuable varieties, including Fir, Pine, Laurel, Cedar, Hemlock, Yew, etc. The most valuable is Sugar Pine, which is found in greater or less quantities all over the Township. Gold has been found in some localities in small quantities.

There are some three or more settlements in the
