Subdivisions of T. 32 S., R. 2 W.

CHAINS

for $\frac{1}{2}$ sec. cor., marked $\frac{1}{2}$ on the W. face. No trees in limits. Raise mound of stone, 2 ft. base, $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high, W. of cor. Pits impracticable.

61.00 Summit of Divide, between Cow Creek and Umpqua River, 700 ft. above Cow Creek, bears NW. and SE. Descend N. slope into Drews Basin.

70.00 More gradual descent.

98.44 Intersect S. Bdy; of T. 31 S R 2 W., 160 chs. E. of the $\frac{1}{2}$ sec. cor. on the S. bdy. of sec. 32

At point of intersection set an ironstone, 24x10x4 ins., 18 ins. in ground, for closing corner of secs. 5 and 6, marked C. C. on S. face, with 1 groove on W. and 5 grooves on the E. faces, from which

A fir, 14 ins. diam., bears S.44*E., 41 lks. dist.

Marked T 32 S R 2 W S 5 B T.

A fir, 20 ins. diam., bears S.31 $\frac{1}{2}$ *W., 16 lks. dist.

Marked T 32 S R 2 W S 6 B T.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, sandy, and gravelly, second and third rate.

Timber, fir, hemlock, matherone and sugar pine.

Undergrowth, laurel, vine maple and small first.

Mountainous land. 98.44 chs.

 General Description

This township is rough and mountainous in the northern and western part, rolling in the eastern and somewhat level in the southern part. The soil of the rolling plateaus in secs. 10, 15, 20 and 25, 26, 28 is rich and fertile. There are stretches of swamp lands in sec. 1, 12, 20, 25 and 16. The rough and mountainous lands are suitable for grazing.

The high plateaus of the central and eastern part are heavily timbered with fir and hemlock. Sugar pine
