The land in this Township along Cow Creek and its tributaries are first rate alluvial soil, the hills being a light, decomposed granite, third rate.
The timber of this Township is far superior to the average run of Townships, being more equally distributed, and consisting of a large amount of Sugar Pine, a timber much valued by lumbermen.
This Township is also rich in water power privileges, as there are but few sections unprovided, and some as 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 10 in great abundance.
Gold is found along the main creek and nearly all its tributaries. No place now occupied for mining purposes.
