General Description.

The Township on either side of this line lies in a mountainous, heavily timbered, well watered country. The timber consists principally of Fir, Cedar, Pine, Chinquapin, Maple, Madrona, Alder and Yew, some of which is valuable and can be practicably utilized. Large areas abound with a dense undergrowth of Rhododendron, Mountain Balm, Manzanita, Vine Maple, Huckleberry, Salal Berry, Chinquapin, Hazel and Ocean Spray.

These parts have long been prospected for precious metals.
