Land, mountainous.

Soil, loam and stony; second and third rate.

Timber, Red and White Fir, Sugar Pine, Cedar and Laurel.

Undergrowth, Arrowwood, Hazel, Hemlock, Laurel, and Rho-  
dodendron.

Mountainous or heavily timbered land or land covered  
with dense undergrowth, 97.85 chs.

General Description.

Sections 1, 12 and 13, in this Township are mountainous  
over their whole extent. The mountains are high and  
steep, but not rough or precipitous in general. The  
tract contains good bodies of heavy timber and nearly  
the whole area is covered with dense undergrowth and  
is exceedingly difficult to survey.

Cow creek runs in a general northerly course through Sec.  
13 and in a northwesterly course through Sec. 12. The  
land adapted to agriculture lies along the creek bot-  
tom, which is generally narrow. The soil of the bot-  
tom is very fertile and responds readily to cultivation.

Red Fir is by far the most plentiful timber and is gen-  
erally of good quality. Some of the trees are quite  
large, six and seven feet in diameter. The Yellow
