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Subdivisions of T. 32 S., R. 3 W.

CHAINS

Pine grows mainly on the South slopes and is of excellent quality, though the growth is sparse. The North slopes, the higher mountains and the canyons, also have the White Fir, Cedar and Hemlock in limited quantity. There are also some good growths of Laurel or Madrone.

Water is plentiful in this district, as nearly every canyon has a stream. The water of Cow Creek can be easily diverted for irrigating purposes.

Some gold is found along the creeks and gulches, but generally in too small quantities to make mining profitable. There is a quartz mine and a placer mine on Beaver Creek, and a copper prospect is being developed in the South part of Sec. 13, on Balm Butte.

Frank Williams in Sec. 1 has a cabin and a barn, with some 20 acres under fence, with some ground in cultivation. John Williams, in Sec. 12, has a cabin and barn and some 30 acres under fence, with five or six acres under cultivation. He has four or five head of stock, horses and cattle.

Re-survey of Subdivision Lines of T. 32 S., R. 3 W., same Deputy and Contract.

I commence at the cor. of Secs. 1, 2, 11 and 12.

I re-establish the cor. in its original position as follows:

Set an ironstone 20x10x5 ins., 15 ins. in the ground, for cor. of Secs. 1, 2, 11 and 12, marked with 5 notches on S. and 1 notch on E. edge, from which

A red Fir, 20 ins. diam., bears N.59*E., 216 lks. dist., marked T.32 S R.3 W S 1 B T.

A Red Fir, 30 ins., diam., bears S.26*E., 51 lks. dist., marked T 32 S R 3 W S 12 B T.

An Alder, 10 ins. diam., bears S.66*W., 92 lks. dist., marked T 32 S R 3 W S 11 B T.

A Red Fir, 30 ins. diam., bears N.40*W., 387 lks. dist., marked T 32 S R 3 W S 2 B T.

No nearer bearing tree is available in Sec. 2.
