

West Bdy. of T. 32 S., R. 5 W.

CHAINS

is about one mile wide and has a very rich alluvial soil. The Willamette and Rouge River Valley road passes through it along which are several settlers. There are no settlements in this vicinity except immediately in the valley along the creek. The mountains, both North and South of the Valley are deemed unfit for settlement except the slopes bordering on the valley, which furnish very good grazing. The timber is principally Fir, some Oak, Pine, Vine Maple, Laurel, etc., with undergrowth of same.

Subdivisions of T. 32 S., R. 5 W.,  
as surveyed by Wells Lake, Deputy Surveyor,  
under Contract No. 54, dated Feb. 19, 1855.

East, on random bet. Secs. 18 and 19, 17 and 20, 16 and 21, 15 and 22, 14 and 23, 13 and 24, and at 6 miles, 4 chs. and 50 lks. intersect the East bdy. 160 lks. North of post. Therefore the correction is 30 lks. East and 26-2/3 lks. South per mile and true course N.89\*49'W. on true line of each mile.

The above random was necessary as both North and South boundaries are in mountains unfit for settlement and, therefore, not subdivided.
