General Description

Cow Creek runs through this township from NE. to SW. along which lies a very fertile Valley of about a half mile in width. The canyon mountain on the N. extends south to the creek valley, the south slopes of which, near the base, are open and good grazing land. The south entrance to the canyon, through which the road passes from Willamette to Rogue River Valley, is near the NE. corner of the township. The canyon mountain high, heavily timbered, and very much broken being totally unfit for settlement.

There is also a high range on the south, dividing the waters of Wolf and Cow Creek, which is unfit for settlement.

There has been considerable gold mining on Cow Creek, and one of its tributaries called Starve Out Creek,
