General Description

The best portions of this Township has been subdivided, heretofore. A Portion of this however is good agricultural lands, the bottoms along the creeks; other portions are valuable for grazing purposes.

Claims have already been located in secs. 2, 9, 10, 23, 26 and 27.

The timber is chiefly the different varieties of Fir, Cedar, Pine and Oak, also Yew, Laurel, Maple, Ash, and Dogwood, and is pretty well distributed over the township contained in these notes.

There are mines of sufficient richness to justify their being worked in secs. 25, 26, 35, and 36.

It being smoky when this survey was made I presume
