

Retracement of Subdivisional Lines of T. 32 S., R. 5 W.

CHAINS	
	<p>From the cor. of Secs. 22, 23, 26 and 27, being a Yew post (in mound of stone), I run</p> <p>N.89*45'W., on line bet. Secs. 22 and 27. Through a level bottom, covered heavily with large Firs, Cedars, Maples, Vine Maples, Hazels and small Firs.</p>
5.33	A wagon road, bears N. and S.
19.30	A dry branch, C. NE.; begin a gradual ascent of E. slope of mountain.
31.00	The ascent becomes steeper; the timber changes to Oak grubbs and Laurels.
40.24	<p>$\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. cor., which is a Bl. Oak post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. sq., 1 ft. above ground, marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 22 on N. face and 27 on S. face; (set by Co. Surveyor) and witnessed as described by the surveyor general; I remarked all bearing trees. This post stands about 150 ft. above Sec. cor.; I continue ascent.</p>
52.90	<p>Top of mountain ridge, bears SW. and NE.; 150 ft. above $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. cor., enter old burn, bears N. and S.; begin descent.</p>
60.00	A ravine, course N., 75 ft. below top of mountain; begin ascent of a spur.
65.00	<p>Top of mountain spur, bears N. and S., 75 ft. above ravine; leave burn; go along N. mountain slope, covered by large and small fir timber, and very brushy.</p>
80.66	<p>The cor. of Secs. 21 and 22.</p> <p>Land, hilly and mountainous.</p> <p>Soil, gravelly, 2nd and 4th rate.</p> <p>Timber, Fir, Cedar, Maple.</p> <p>Undergrowth, small Firs, Vine Maples, Hazel.</p>
