

## Subdivisions of Tp. 32 S., R 7 W.

## CHAINS

This Township is very mountainous and broken with small valleys along Cow Creek and its tributaries. It is therefore chiefly valuable for its timbers, which are generally good and containing Fir, two or three varieties of Pine, Cedar, Laurel, Madrone, Chinquapin, Yew, Alder, Maple and Live Oak.

Gold is found in paying quantities in several localities in the Township and in small quantities in nearly every water course in it.

Retracement of the 7th Standard Parallel South through Range 7 West as surveyed by Oscar F. Thiel, Deputy Surveyor, under Special Instructions dated Sept. 12, 1901, in connection with his contract No. 729, dated Dec. 24, 1900.

I begin the retracement of the North boundary of Sec. 5, at the closing cor. of Secs. 4 and 5, which stands 10.82 chs. east of Standard cor. of Secs. 32 and 33 Tp. 32 S., R 7 W.

Thence I run

West, between Secs. 5 and 33

Ascend low spur, bears N and S covered with scattering timber.

2.75 Wagon road from Glendale to the mines, bears S.35\*W., and N.35\*E., descend N slope of mountain.

10.82 Standard cor. of secs. 32 and 33, 150 ft. below closing cor; continue descend West between Secs. 5 and 32

3.25 A Stream, 10 lks. wide, course N.65\*E., ascend E slope.

12.25 A Stream, 1 lk, wide, course SE Continue ascent.

18.60 A Stream 1 lk wide, course SE still ascending.

34.50 Top of ascent, go along a flat.

39.28  $\frac{1}{4}$  Sec. Cor. which having disappeared I replace by setting A Cedar post, 3 feet long, 3 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the ground, for standard  $\frac{1}{4}$  Sec. Cor. marked
