CHAINS

Timber, chiefly Pine, Fir, Laurel, and Cedar.  
Undergrowth, densely covered and thick, of same kinds  
of wood, with Balm, Live Oak, and Chinquapin.

West, on South boundary of Sec. 35.

- 4.50 Steep descent.
- 10.25 A creek, 4 lks. wide, course NW ascent.
- 40.00 Set a Laurel post, 3 ins. sq., 3 feet long, 20 ins. in  
the ground marked S C  $\frac{1}{4}$  S for the quarter sec. cor.,  
from which  
A Laurel, 7 ins. diam., bears N. 16° E., 30 lks. dist.  
Marked S C  $\frac{1}{4}$  S- B T.  
A Laurel, 8 ins. diam., bears S. 42° E., 22 lks. dist.  
Marked S C  $\frac{1}{4}$  S- B T.
- 43.00 Top of spur, course North, steep descent.
- 68.16 A creek, 5 lks. wide, course NE.
- 80.00 Set a stone 14/12/10 ins., 10 ins. in the ground for the  
standard cor. to secs. 34 and 35., marked  
S C on N 2 notches on E and 4 on W sides of same, from  
which  
A Fir, 12 ins. diam., bears N. 24° E., 28 lks. dist.  
Marked S C T 32 S R S W S 35 B T.  
A Fir, 26 ins. diam., bears S. 54° E., 13 lks. dist.  
Marked S C T 33 S R S W S 2 B.  
A Fir, 15 ins. diam., bears N. 45° W., 63 lks. dist.  
Marked S C T 32 S R S W S 34 B T.

Soil, 4th rate.  
Timber, chiefly Fir, Pine, Cedar, and Laurel.  
Undergrowth, densely covered and thick, chiefly Fir,
