Subdivisions of T. 33 S., R. 7 W.

CHAINS

T 33 S S 4 on NE., R 7 W S 9 on SE., S 8 on SW. and S on NW. faces; with 5 notches on S. and 4 notches on E. edges, from which

A Chinquapin, 5 ins. diam., bears N.53*E., 19 lks. dist., Marked T 33 S R 7 W S 4 B T.

A Chinquapin, 5 ins. diam., bears S.44*E., 22 lks. dist., Marked T 33 S R 7 W S 9 B T.

A Laurel, 4 ins. diam., bears S.42*W., 14 lks. dist. Marked T 33 S R 7 W S 8 B T.

A Chinquapin, 4 ins. diam., bears N.9*W., 5 lks. dist. Marked T 33 S R 7 W S 5 B T.

Land, mountainous, very rough.

Soil, rocky, fourth rate.

Timber, Fir, Pine, Laurel, Live Oak, Chinquapin.

Undergrowth, Wax Myrtles, small Laurels and Oaks.

Mountainous or heavily timbered land or covered with dense undergrowth. 80.00 chs.

Aug. 5th 1901

Thence, I run S.89*45'E., on a random line between secs. 4 and 9.

40.00 Set temporary $\frac{1}{2}$ sec. corner.

79.68 Intersect N. and S. line 45 lks. S. of corner of secs. 3, 4, 9 and 10, which is a Laurel post, some decayed, 1 foot high, 4 ins. square, marked and witnessed as described by the surveyor general.

Thence, I run S.89*56'W. on a true line between secs. 4 and 9.

Ascend a steep, rocky E. mountainslope covered by a dense undergrowth of small Firs and Laurels and Greasewood, Waxberries.

12.00 A top of spur, bears N. and S., 150 feet above sec. corner, begin descent.
