General Description

The surface of this township is mountainous, ranging in elevation from 1500 ft. to over 5500 ft. above sea level. Harding Butte in sec. 35 being the highest point in the township. The entire township is drained through tributaries by the North Umpqua River.

The soil is generally a coarse rocky sand and clay loam and humus, from a few inches to several ft. in depth, usually on basaltic bed rock which outcrops in many places.

The land is well timbered with fir, hemlock, cedar, pine, and some yew, chinquapin, and madrona; and is generally covered with a dense growth of vine-maple, rhododendron, hazel, chinquapin, huckleberry, arrow-wood, manzanita, alder, willow, salal, and
