Township 25 $\frac{1}{2}$ South, Range 2 East.

CHAINS

is a rock about 3.00 chs. wide E and W., and about 5.00 chs. long N. and S., some 50 ft. high above the surrounding country. This rock being located on the divide between Steamboat Creek and the North Umpqua river affords a view of a very large portion of the North Umpqua National Forest.

The drainage of the fractional township to the east of this rock is to the North Umpqua River, that to the west of this rock is to Steamboat Creek, a tributary of the North Umpqua River.

Grassy Ranch Trail and forest service telephone line enter this township on the S. bdy. of sec. 34 and traverse to the NE. around the base of Illahe Rock leaving the Tp. on the N. bdy. of sec. 35. There are two way trails, under construction, following the top of the spurs through secs. 35 and 36. There is a lookout trail from the main trail to the lookout.

This fractional township is covered with a medium heavy growth of fir, cedar, pine, hemlock, yew, and some alder, dogwood, chinquapin, and madrona, none of much commercial value. It is covered with a medium heavy undergrowth of vinemaple, rhododendron, mountain laurel, wild cherry, manzanita, huckle berry budk brush, chinquapin, goose berry, and arrow-wood.

No mineral indications were noted in this Tp.

There are no settlers in this fractional Tp.

Glide, located about 50 miles down the river from Illahe Rock, reached by trail and auto road, is the nearest supply point and post office.

The magnetic needle is very unreliable, practically useless, having a variation of from N.15°E to N.26°E., due to local attraction. The mean variation, however, is about N.21 $\frac{1}{2}$ °E.
