more or less. Other main trails are; Twin Lakes Trail branches from the North Umpqua Trail at the mouth of Copeland Creek and bears in a southerly direction, leaving the Tp. E. of the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 3 and 34; The Bradley Trail branches from the mail trail at the bridge, continues up the river, leaving the Tp. at Pine Bench; the Grassy Ranch Trail branches from the main trail at Illahe and bears in a northerly direction, leaving the Tp. on the N. bdy. of Sec. 3. There are several way trails.

This Tp. abounds in points of interest to the tourist. Illahe, a large, nearly level bench in Secs. 15, 16, 21, and 22, was a gathering place for the Indians, used as a counsel ground and a tract for horse racing and other Indian sports.

Rattlesnake Rock, on line bet. secs. 13 and 14, is a dome shaped rock, about 180 ft. high, on the upper and better than 300 ft. high on the lower sides. It is about 5 chs. E. and W. and 3 chs. N. and S. Eagle Rock, in the SW. $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 14, is made up of several large ragged rocks, about 100 ft. high on the upper and 200 ft. high on the lower sides, with vertical faces. It is about 4 chs. E. and W. and 1.25 chs. N. and S.

There are several other picturesque rocks and cliffs near the end of Rattlesnake Ridge, Eagle Ridge and along Ragged Ridge.

The main camps, other than at ranches, are: Hole-in-the-Ground Camp in Sec. 32; Dixie Queen Camp in SE. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 3; John Collins Camp in NE. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 4; and Six Gun Camp near the cor. of secs. 1, 6, 7, and 12, in Sec. 6.
