	<p style="text-align: center;">General Description</p> <p>This township is in the Umpqua National Forest. A considerable variety of land and soil are found in T.26 S., R. 3 E. The elevation ranges from about 1700 ft. on the river in sec. 18 to about 5400 ft. above sea level, on Thorn Mountain in secs. 1 and 12. There are several large nearly level benches in the SW. part of the township, known as Oak Flats. There is a large nearly level bench in secs. 27, 28, 33, and 34, between the canyons of Fish Creek and the North Umpqua River, this is the north end of the Fish Creek Desert. There is a large nearly level bench of about 200 acres in secs. 7 and 18, between the canyons of Boulder Creek and the North Umpqua River, known as Pine Bench. The remainder of the township is rough mountainous. The soil is of a volcanic origin. In some parts of the township vegetable matter has mixed with this volcanic ash and pumice to form a mountain loam of fair rate.</p>
