General Description

the Mountain Meadow Trail, which is a good trail, though steep in places, dropping about 750 ft. to the river, where the Forest Service has built a good bridge. The river at this point is only about 50 lks. wide and several ft. deep.

The main trail turns NE., and follows up the river. A foot way trail has been provided down the river to view the beauties of Toketee Falls, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile below, near the center of sec. 35. This foot trail follows near the river, which rushes and boils, between two walls, in places less than 20 ft. apart, over numerous small falls and pot holes, finally plunging over Toketee Falls for a drop of more than 100 ft. as a wall of white foam, blending with all the colors of the rainbow. The walls of the canyon 50 or more ft. above the water, extend in a semi-circle, on each side of the falls, giving the water the appearance of being poured through a large window.

If the nature lover is also a disciple of Isaak Walton he need go no farther, as some of the best fishing in a stream noted for its fishing, is found just below these falls.

From the river bridge another way trail leads north past Deer Leap Rock, in ~~the~~ SW  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. 26. This rock is only a few feet wide on top; dropping for several hundred feet in a perpendicular wall on the west side. It affords a wonderful view of the surrounding country. There is a U.S. Geological Survey bench mark on top of this rock; elevation 3558 ft. above sea level.

"Indian Caves" located near the center of Sec. 17, near Bradley Trail, are not caves in the true sense of the word, but are shelters, used by the Indians, formed by large rocks, the size of two and three roomed houses.
