CHAINS

General Description

The whole of this township is mountainous, lying on the East slope of the Cascade Range of mountains: and is covered with a fine growth of yellow pine and red fir timber.

The Southern part is well watered by clear cold mountain streams- but the northern part is exceedingly dry, and not very suitable for settlement.

Subdivisions of T. 27 S. R. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ E.
As surveyed by Samuel C. Flint, U.S. Deputy Surveyor, under his contract No. 484, dated July 28, A. D. 1883.

I began at the Stan. cor. of secs. 35 and 36, T. 27 S R 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ E. which is a pine post 48 ins. by 4 ins. sqr. and marked S C T 27 S R 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ E on N- S 36 on E. and S35 on W. faces, with 1 notch on E. and 4 notches on W. edges, from which:

A pine, 12 ins. diam., bears N.20*W., 26 lks.

dist., marked T 27 S R 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ E S 35, B T

A pine, 8 ins. diam., bears N.58*E., 30 lks.

dist., marked T 27 S R 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ E S 36 B T

A pine, 10 ins. diam., bears S.42*W., 10 lks.

dist., marked S B T

Thence I run N. bet. secs. 35 and 36. Va. 18*15'E.

40.00 Set pine post, 44 ins. by 4 ins. sqr. 12 ins. in the ground for $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S on W. face, from which:

A pine, 8 ins. diam., bears S.55*W., 26 lks.

dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T

A pine, 12 ins., diam., bears S.80*E., 5 lks.

dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T

60.50 Summit of Ridge, Course E. and W.

79.40 Stream, 5 lks. wide, course E.
