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General Description.

The surface of this township varies from rolling to rugged mountainous. Its elevation above sea level ranges from 2500 ft. on the west boundary at the point where Castle Rock Creek, crosses to nearly 6800 ft. on Rattle Snake Mountain.

The soil is decomposed rock, varying from rough coarse gravel to fine sand mixed with some loam. The hard sandstone bed rock outcrops in many places.

The drainage is into the North and the South Umpqua rivers. The water is excellent.

The fir and pine timber is good excepting in the very highest parts of the township.

There is approximately the area of three sections of good grazing land distributed through the eastern and northern parts of the township.

There are no known valuable minerals.

Grazing is the only profitable pursuit.
