

Subdivision of T. 29 S., R. 1 E.

CHAINS

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar; undergrowth, fir, hemlock, vine maple.

October 21, 1910.

General Description

This fractional township lies on the divide between the North and South Forks of the South Umpqua River. South of the divide the slopes are generally gradual with frequent openings and considerable land adapted to agriculture. The slopes North of the divide are somewhat steeper and are cut by deeper canyons.

Heavy timber occupies the greater portion of the area, principally fir and pine on the south side and fir and hemlock on the north side of the divide. Considerable cedar, also grows on both sides of the divide. No mineral discoveries have been made so far as I have been able to ascertain.

There is one settler in the township, H. L. Acker, in secs. 34, and 35. He has a house, 10x20 ft., two barns, 30x50 and 20x50 ft., about 100 acres under fence, mostly cultivated or seeded to grass, wagon and farm machinery, including mower and sulky rake, about 100 head of cattle and 6 horses. Approximate value of improvements, \$9000.
