GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This township lies on the west slope of the Cascade Mountains; is drained by the South Umpqua River, the main tributaries being South Fork of South Umpqua River, Buckeye Creek and Fish Lake Creek.

Highest point is on, or near, east boundary of section 13, and lowest point is on south Boundary of section 31, while the northwest corner of the township, is but little above the level of bed of South Umpqua River; the elevation ranging from about 2,000 ft. to 5,500 ft. above sea level.

Soil, is, generally, clay loam overlaying a very dense clay ~~subsoil~~, all intermingled with small stones.

In but few places, is the soil suitable for tillage, but good grass, for forage, is found, wherever the shade is not too dense.

Practically all the land is covered with a good growth of timber, except where the trees have been killed by fire.

Timber consists of Douglas fir, white fir, sugar pine, and yellow pine, and some hemlock. The Douglas fir and sugar pine afford the most valuable stand of timber, the latter being scattering but in the aggregate, comprise a great many magnificent specimens.
