

Dependent Resurvey of a Portion of the
Subdivisional Lines of T. 20 S., R. 8 W.

CHAINS

44.60

A ravine, course S. 80° E.; asc. 150 ft. over SE. slope, changing to S. slope.

48.35

A spur ridge, bears N. 75° E. and S. 75° W.; desc. 450 ft. over N. slope, changing to NW. slope.

60.75

A branch, 3 lks. wide, course N. 75° E.; asc. 220 ft. over SE. slope.

68.90

A spur, slopes S. 60° E.; desc. 50 ft. along E. slope, changing to NE. slope.

71.50

A ravine, course S. 80° E.; asc. 50 ft. over SE. slope.

73.50

A small spur, slopes E.; desc. 50 ft. over NE. slope.

75.50

A branch, 1 lk. wide, course S. 55° E.; asc. 144 ft. over S. slope.

80.38

The cor. of secs. 19, 20, 29, and 30, determined at the record distance from the original NE. bearing tree and the record bearing and distance from the original SE., SW., and NW. bearing trees, as follows:

A fir stump, 12 ins. diam., bears N. 50° E., 20 lks. dist., with blaze decayed. (Record bearing N. 53° E.)

A fir, 14 ins. diam., bears S. 55° E., 25 lks. dist., with blaze healed.

A stumphole, bears S. 42° W., 21 lks. dist.

A fir stub, 6 ins. diam., bears N. 34° W., 14 lks. dist., with the scribe marks BT S19 visible on the partly overgrown blaze.

At the corner point

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked

from which new bearing trees

A fir, 14 ins. diam., bears N. 10° E., 24 lks. dist., marked T20S R8W S20 BT.

A fir, 26 ins. diam., bears S. 71½° W., 49 lks. dist., marked T20S R8W S30 BT.

A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears N. 36½° W., 35 lks. dist., marked T20S R8W S19 BT.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, sandy clay loam.

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, maple, alder, madrona, chinquapin, dogwood, yew, and cascara.

Undergrowth, vine maple, salmonberry, thimbleberry, devil's-club, hazel, arrowwood, evergreen huckleberry, red huckleberry and salal.

From the cor. of secs. 20, 21, 28, and 29.

S. 88° 21' W., bet. secs. 20 and 29.

Descend 233 ft. over NW. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.
