

Dependent Resurvey of Part of the South Boundary of
T. 21 S., R. 8 W.

CHAINS

Land, mountainous.
Soil, loose sandy loam, 1st and 2nd rate.
Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, alder, maple, madrona, yew, chinquapin, dogwood and cascara.
Undergrowth, bracken, vinemaple, salal, salmonberry, slickleaf, manzanita, raspberry, blackberry, thimbleberry, rhododendron and poison oak.

N. 89° 17' E., on S. bdy. of sec. 32.

Desc. 252 ft. over NE. slope, through heavy dead timber and dense undergrowth.

4.70 A branch, 5 lks. wide, course N. 15° W.; asc. 714 ft. over SW. slope.

35.40 A spur, slopes N. 20° W.; desc. 33 ft. over NE. slope.

39.20 Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 32 only, determined at the record measurement from each of the old bearing trees.

At point for corner,

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, for $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 32 only, with brass cap mkd.

A stump hole, bears N. 42° E., 60 lks. dist., which is the remains of an old bearing tree.

A fir, 48 ins. diam., bears S. 73° E., 50 lks. dist., marked on bark $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T. (An old bearing tree which I do not deface because it is the only remaining apparent evidence of the old corner.)

A fir, 32 ins. diam., bears N. 56 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 186 lks. dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S 32 B T. (New B.T.)

A fir, 28 ins. diam., bears N. 87 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 222 lks. dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S 32 B T. (New B.T.)

This $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. is located in the head of a ravine, course N., about 1 ch. N. of the ridge which is the divide bet. Weatherly Creek and the Umpqua River, at edge of burn bears NE. and SW.

N. 89° 21' E., with new measurement.

Asc. 45 ft. over NW. slope, through heavy green timber and dense undergrowth.

4.10 Ridge, divide bet. Weatherly Creek and Umpqua River, and foot trail, bears N. 70° E. and S. 70° W.; asc. 30 ft. over broken S. slope.

12.70 A spur, slopes S.; desc. 232 ft. over broken SE. slope.

18.15 A spring, flows SE.

25.57 The closing corner of secs. 4 and 5, T. 22 S., R. 8 W., bears North, 13 lks. dist., a Douglas fir, 32 ins. diam., with surface scars on E., S., and W. sides. I re-blaze and re-mark this old tree closing corner as follows:

S 4 on E.,
C C T 22 S R 8 W on S., and
S 5 on W. side;
