

Dependent Resurvey of the S. Bdy. of the T. 25 S., R. 3 W.

CHAINS

A fir, 12 ins. diam., bears N.81½°E., 74 lks. dist.,
mkd. ¼ S 36 B T.

A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears S.77½°W., 63 lks. dist.,
mkd. ¼ S 1 B T.

Desc. 130 ft. over broken NE, slope.

53.10 A branch, 3 lks. wide, course S.; asc. 14 ft. over SW.
slope.

54.60 Top of ascent on S. slope; desc. 14 ft. over SE. slope.

57.50 A marshy branch, 6 lks. wide, course SW.; asc. 21 ft.
over broken SW. slope.

60.00 An abandoned logging road, bears NW. and SE.

66.20 A graveled road and telephone line at bend, bears NW.
and SW ; top of ascent on S. slope; desc. 127 ft.
over steep E. slope.

70.30 Rock Creek, 180 lks. wide, course S.; asc. 392 ft. over
steep W. slope, changing to broken W. slope.

79.68 The original corner of Tps. 25 and 26 S., Rs. 2 and 3
W., which was established by Addison R. Flint, Deputy
Surveyor, in 1855, and which was perpetuated by Chas.
M. Collier, Surveyor, in 1913, where I find a basalt
stone 24x10x10 ins., firmly set, mkd. with 6 notches on
N., S., E., and W. edges.

At point for corner,

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. diam., 28 ins. in the
ground, with the marked stone deposited at the base, for
cor. of Tps. 25 and 26 S., Rs. 2 and 3 W., with brass
capmkd.

with blaze healed. (A Collier B.T.)

A fir 46 ins. diam., bears S.36°E., 64 lks. dist.,
with partial scribe marks on old bark blaze. (A
Flint bearing tree which I re-blaze and re-mark

A dead madrona, 6 ins. diam., bears S.85°W., 31 lks.
dist., mkd. T 26 S R 3 W S 1 B T. (Collier B.T.)

A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears N.23½°W., 31 lks. dist.,
with blaze healed. (A Collier B.T.)

A fir, 18 ins. diam., bears S.77°W., 61 lks. dist.,
mkd. T 26 S R 3 W S 1 B T. (New B.T.)

Land, mountainous.

Spil, sandy loam and rocky clay; 2d and 3d rate;

Timber, fir, cedar, hemlock, pine, madrona, chinquapin,
alder, and maple.

Undergrowth, vinemaple, poison oak, willow, and hazel.
