CHAINS

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, with the original stone deposited at the base, for closing cor. of secs. 19 and 30, with brass cap mkd.

A red cedar, 20 ins. diam., bears N.56½°E., 34 lks. dist., mkd. T 25 S R 2 W S 19 C C B T. (Old B.T.)

A hemlock, 12 ins. diam., dead and down, bears S.69 3/4°E., 58 lks. dist., mkd. T 25 S R 2 W S 30 C C B T. (Old B.T.)

A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears S.37°E., 65 lks. dist., mkd. T 25 S R 2 W S 30 C C B T. (New B.T.)

Asc. 46 ft. over SE. slope.

78.20 A spur, slopes E.; desc. 34 ft. over NE. slope.

80.60 Head of ravine, course E.; asc. 4 ft. over SE. slope.

81.10 Point for original sec. cor. which now refers to secs. 24 and 25 only, determined by reference to the record measurements from the old NE., SE., and SW. bearing trees, and record bearing from the old NW. bearing tree.

At point for corner,

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, for cor. of secs. 24 and 25, with brass cap mkd.

A fir, 54 ins. diam., bears N.69°E., 9 lks. dist., with partial scribe marks on old bark blaze which I obliterate. (Old B.T.)

A red cedar, 22 ins. diam., bears S.32½°E., 76 lks. dist., mkd. T 25 R 2 S 30 B T. I obliterate the marks on this old bearing tree.

A red cedar, 28 ins. diam., bears S.44½°W., 30 lks. dist., with blaze healed. I re-blaze and re-mark this old bearing tree T 25 S R 3 W S 25 B T.

A fir, 56 ins. diam., bears N.65°W., 36 lks. dist., with partial scribe marks on old bark blaze. I re-blaze and re-mark this old bearing tree T 25 S R 3 W S 24 B T.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, sandy loam and rocky clay; 2d and 3d rate.

Timber, fir, cedar, pine, hemlock, maple, alder, oak, chinquapin, madrona, and dogwood.

Undergrowth, vinemaple, arrowwood, willow, slickleaf, hazel, manzanita, salal, bracken, salmonberry, rhododendron, lilac, and huckleberry.
