

Dependent Resurvey of the Sub. of T. 25 S., R. 3 W.

CHAINS

dist., mkd. T 25 S R 3 W S 14 B T. (New B.T.)

Land, mountainous.
 Soil, sandy loam and rocky clay; 2d and 3d rate.
 Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, yew, pine, alder, maple,
 madrona, chinquapin, and dogwood.
 Undergrowth, vinemaple, salal, salmonberry, bracken,
 hazel, willow, arrowwood, manzanita, and slickleaf.

From the cor. of secs. 13 and 24 only, on the E. bdy. of
 the Tp.

S. 89° 13' W., bet. secs. 13 and 24.

Asc. 219 ft. over SE. slope, through heavy timber and
 dense undergrowth.

32.00 Enter boulder strewn talus slope, bears NW. and SE.

40.30 The original $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., the evident badly decayed re-
 mains of a squared fir stake on which only ax marks
 could be found.

At point for corner,

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 28 ins. in the
 ground, with remains of decayed fir stake deposited at
 the base, for $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., with brass cap mkd.

from which

A dead Douglas fir, 54 ins. diam., bears N.11 $\frac{1}{4}$ °E., 37
 lks. dist., mkd. on bark $\frac{1}{4}$ S B T. (Old B.T.)

A white fir, 14 ins. diam., bears S.11°E., 43 lks.
 dist., with blaze healed. (Old B.T.)

A Douglas fir, 36 ins. diam., bears N.32°E., 118 lks.
 dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S 13 B T. (New B.T.)

Thence

S. 68° 44' W., with new measurement.

Asc. 427 ft. over a SE. talus slope considerably strewn
 with huge basaltic boulders, near base of a towering
 bluff, through the mist created by several small
 streams pouring over the bluff.

23.80 Top of bluff, 300 ft. high, bears N.65°E. and S.50°W.

26.40 Top of ascent on S. slope; desc. 260 ft. over SW. slope.

50.80 A branch, 8 lks. wide, course SE.; asc. 10 ft. over
 broken SE. slope.

56.64 The cor. of secs. 13, 14, 23, and 24.

 Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, pine, yew, chinquapin, oak,
 maple, madrona, alder, and dogwood.
 Undergrowth, vinemaple, lilac, manzanita, slickleaf,
 willow, hazel, ninebark, arrowwood, and poison oak.
