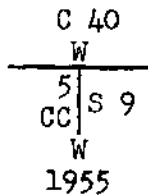


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Portion of the Subdivisional Lines of Sec. 9, T. 29 S., R. 7 W.

A fir, 25 ins. diam., bears S. 67° E., 31 lks. dist., marked WW S 9 CC BT.

A fir, 21 ins. diam., bears S. 21° W., 48 lks. dist., marked L 5 WW S 9 CC BT.

From this corner the point for the southeast corner of donation land claim No. 40 bears S. 86°41' E., 3.34 chs. dist., previously described.

From the same corner the point for the southwest corner of donation land claim No. 40 bears N. 86°41' W., 46.66 chs. dist., previously described.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay.

Timber, fir, oak, maple and madrona.

Undergrowth, vine maple, arrowwood, poison oak and fern.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Section 9, township 29 south, range 7 west is located in Douglas County, approximately 15 miles southwest of Roseburg, Oregon in the semi-mountainous valley between the Cascade and Coast Ranges. The elevation ranges from 600 to 1100 feet above sea level.

The section is timbered with second growth fir, oak, maple, and madrona; the undergrowth consists of vine maple, arrowwood, poison oak, and fern. The northwest portion of the section is in pasture. Looking Glass Creek, a meandering stream approximately 30 lks. wide, cuts the west half of the section, in a north and south direction, near the center line of the section. There is one dwelling in the southwest corner of the section. The section is valuable because of its production of timber. No indication of minerals was noted.

The average of a number of readings over all parts of the section gives a value of 19½° E. for the mean magnetic declination. There is a range of 1½° in local attraction.
