## CHAINS

Frame house, 22 x 34 ft., course of long sides E. and W., the NW. cor. of which bears from Cor. 20, S. 8°37' E., 48 lks. dist., value	\$100.00
Frame barn, 26 x 34 ft., course of long sides E. and W., the SW. cor. of which bears from Cor. 10, S. 74°42' E., 50 lks. dist., value	200.00
About 120 rods of pole and picket fencing, value	<u>48.00</u>
Total value of improvements -	\$348.00

DESCRIPTION

This claim lies on level bottom land, and is drained by the main and the North Fork of Harvey Creek, which flows through the claim in a southerly and westerly direction and empties into the Umpqua River about one and one-half miles in a southerly direction from the west end of the claim. About 14 acres of the land within this claim are under cultivation; the balance of the claim is covered with heavy timber of scattering fir, cedar, maple and alder, the latter predominating, and a dense undergrowth of vine maple, willows, etc. The bottom soil is very sandy, 1st rate, while the mountainous soil along the boundaries is 2nd and 3rd rate.

The land is non-mineral in character.

The nearest post office is at Gardiner, Oregon, about twelve miles in a westerly direction, and reached by boat along the Umpqua River, the principal mode of travel in this vicinity.

REMARKS

I found after adjusting a part of line 1-8, Tract A, and line 9-23, Tract B, of H.E.S. No. 129, to the end line of H.E.S. No. 130, Tract A and B, which I had to change (further south), to bring H.E.S. No. 130, Tract B within the statutory length for latitudes, that I could extend the line from Cor. 17, H.E.S. No. 130, Tract B, on the same course, (N. 49°15' W.) and intersect Cor. 2 of the listing survey, (List 6-683), thereby simplifying the bdy. line with a very small additional area.

I also made Cor. No. 1 of H.E.S. No. 129, identical with Cor. No. 8, H.E.S. No. 130, Tract A, to maintain permanency; otherwise to set Cor. No. 1 identical with Cor. W.H. 16 of listing survey, which falls in an unsafe place on the creek bank, this also adds an unappreciable area. Otherwise, this claim, as surveyed, is contained within the listed area.

The true courses of the bdy. lines of this claim were determined by trial lines, except where the proceeding corners were in sight.

It being impracticable to take my assistants before an officer qualified to administer oaths without great inconvenience, delay and expense, I, myself, administer the required oath to the assistants.
