

County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

Resurvey of the North Boundary of T. 32 S., R. 9 W.

CHAINS

A fir, 24 ins. diam., bears S. 83° E., 34 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 1 BT.

A fir, 30 ins. diam., bears S. 28° W., 26 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S 1 BT.

39.58 Intersect the point for old $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 1, located by reference to the bearing trees as described by the surveyor general. I change this cor. to an angle point and perpetuate it as follows: at exact cor. point

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 26 ins. in the ground, for angle point, with brass cap marked

from which

A fir, 24 ins. diam., bears N. 43° E., 38 lks. dist., marked A P BT (Old B. T.)

A fir, 30 ins. diam., bears S. 41° E., 19 lks. dist., marked A P BT. (Old B. T.)

Thence, S. 87° 50' W., continuing my measurements.

Along bluffs on N. slope.

48.70 Creek, 3 lks. wide, course N.

54.70 Ravine, course N.; ascend.

56.10 Top of spur, slopes N.; ascend.

58.33 Intersect the $\frac{1}{4}$ cor. of sec. 36, T. 31 S., R. 9 W., which is a fir tree, marked as described by the surveyor general. I mark bearing trees for this cor., as follows: from cor.

A laurel, 7 ins. diam., bears N. 55 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 123 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S36 BT.

A maple, 14 ins. diam., bears N. 8° W., 57 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S36 BT.

Thence N. 89° 09' W., continuing my measurements

Descend over bluffs.

60.65 Creek, 10 lks. wide, course N.; ascend steep slope.

62.60 Leave timber, bears N. and S.; enter burn.

65.25 Top of spur, slopes N.; ascend gradual slope.

77.25 (80.00 chs. departure minus the westing of the E. bdy. of the Tp.)

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, for cor. of secs. 1 and 2, with brass cap marked

A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears S. 21° E., 12 lks. dist., marked T32S R9W S1 BT.

A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 30° W., 8 lks. dist., marked T32S R9W S2 BT.

Land, mountainous. Soil, rocky, 4th rate. Timber, fir and sugar
