

County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

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Dependent Resurvey of a Portion of the Subdivisional Lines of T. 20 S., R. 9 W.

CHAINS

23.00 Edge of bottom, bears N. 70° E. and S. 70° W.; asc. 200 ft. over broken SE. slope.

34.55 Top of ascent on S. slope; desc. 105 ft. over SW. slope.

38.74 The cor. of secs. 26, 27, 34, and 35.

Land, mountainous, with narrow, nearly level bottom along river. Soil, sandy clay loam. Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, maple, and alder. Undergrowth, vine maple, evergreen huckleberry, hazel, arrowwood, red huckleberry, and salal.

N. 1° 35' W., bet. secs. 26 and 27.

Ascend 100 ft. over SW. slope, changing to W. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.

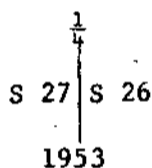
14.90 Spur, slopes W.; desc. 250 ft. over NW. slope.

20.20 Clearwater Creek, 6 lks. wide, course S. 70° W.; asc. 400 ft. over SE. slope.

29.40 Top of ascent on edge of bench, bears NE. and SW.; desc. 55 ft. over gradual N. slope of bench.

40.835 Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 26 and 27, at proportionate distance; there is no remaining evidence of the original corner.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked



from which

A fir, 40 ins. diam., bears S. 31 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 37 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S26 BT.A hemlock, 10 ins. diam., bears N. 69° W., 49 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S27 BT.

Descend 40 ft. over gradual N. slope of flat.

50.85 Enter windfallen timber; edge bears E. and W.

54.75 Leave windfallen timber; edge bears E. and W.

61.35 Edge of bench, bears N. 60° E. and S. 60° W.; desc. 210 ft. over NW. slope.

66.30 Blackwell Creek, 4 lks. wide, course SW.; asc. 200 ft. over SE. slope.

79.00 Top of ascent on E. slope; desc. 100 ft. over NE. slope.

81.25 Ravine, course E.; asc. 30 ft. over SE. slope.

81.67 The cor. of secs. 22, 23, 26, and 27, determined from the original bearing trees, as follows:

A maple, 20 ins. diam., bears N. 83 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 29 lks. dist., plainly blazed and healed.A maple, 26 ins. diam., bears S. 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 40 lks. dist., plainly blazed and healed.
