

County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

Dependent Resurvey of a Portion of the Subdivisional Lines, T. 26 S., R. 7 W.

CHAINS	Land, mountainous. Soil, rocky clay with numerous rock outcroppings and rock bluffs. No timber, logged and burned; undergrowth, ceanothus, manzanita, willow, poison oak, huckleberry, blackberry, madrone, chinquapin, and ocean spray.
	N. 0° 09' E., bet. secs. 20 and 21. Ascend 235 ft. over SW. slope, through logged and burned area in dense undergrowth.
10.65	Dirt access road, 20 lks. wide, bears NW, and SE.
11.50	Top of ascent, slopes NW.; descend 34 ft. over NW. slope.
15.35	Dirt access road, 20 lks. wide, bears E. and W.
22.25	Foot of descent, slopes W.; ascend 85 ft. over SW. slope.
27.10	Spur, slopes W.; ascend 216 ft. over SW. slope.
33.25	Leave logged and burned area, enter prairie, edge bears E. and W.
40.32	Point for $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 20 and 21, at proportionate distance: there is no remaining evidence of the original corner. Set a brass tablet, $3\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., $3\frac{1}{2}$ ins. stem, in a drilled hole in bedrock, marked <div style="text-align: center;"> <p>T26S R7W</p> <p>↑</p> <p>S 20 S 21</p> <p>↓</p> <p>1959</p> </div> from which A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears S. 60° E., 78 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S21 BT. A fir, 14 ins. diam., bears N. 52° W., 140 lks. dist., marked $\frac{1}{4}$ S20 BT. Leave prairie, enter timber, edge bears NW. and SE. Ascend 45 ft. over SW. slope.
42.45	Spur, slopes W.; desc. 527 ft. over NW. slope changing to general N. slope.
45.60	Leave timber, enter logged area, edge bears NE. and SW.
73.20	Dirt access road, 20 lks. wide, bears SE. and SW. curving to W.
80.64	The cor. of secs. 16, 17, 20, and 21, determined at record distance from each of the remaining original bearing trees: A fir, 25 ins. diam., bears N. 16° E., 16 lks. dist., with a healed blaze. (Record bearing, N. 10° E.) The stump hole of a fir that has been dozed out, bears S. 85° W., 6 lks. dist., The tree is lying alongside the stump hole and is burned and rotted fir, 8 ins. diam., with illegible scribe marks visible on an opened blaze. At the corner point.
