A fir, 8 ins. diam., bears N. 61° E., 60 lks. dist., marked T21S R7W S19 BT.

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears S. 42½° E., 26 lks. dist., marked T21S R7W S30 BT.

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears S. 50½° W., 15 lks. dist., marked T21S R8W S25 BT.

A fir, 30 ins. diam., bears N. 35¼° W., 109 lks. dist., marked T21S R8W S24 BT.

Land, mountainous. Soil, rocky clay and sandstone. Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, maple, alder, chinquapin, dogwood, and madrona. Undergrowth, vine maple, hazel, arrowwood, ceanothus, manzanita, rhododendron, bracken, and poison oak.

N. 0° 20' W., bet. secs. 19 and 24.

Ascend 75 ft. over SE. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.

- 4.95 Spur, slopes N. 65° E.; desc. 220 ft. over NW. slope.
- 8.95 Dry bed of stream, 1 lk. wide, course NE.; along broken E. slope.
- 9.55 Spur, slopes N. 70° E.; desc. 10 ft. over NE. slope.
- 10.10 Dry bed of stream, 1 lk. wide, course E.; asc. 75 ft. over SE. slope.
- 12.75 Spur, slopes N. 80° E.; desc. 70 ft. over NE. slope.
- 14.90 Dry bed of stream, 1 lk. wide, course E.; asc. 52 ft. over SE. slope.
- 16.10 Spur, slopes E.; desc. 74 ft. over NE. slope.
- 18.00 Dry bed of stream, 2 lks. wide, course E.; asc. 338 ft. over steep S. slope.
- 25.15 Spur ridge, bears N. 70° W. and S. 70° E.; asc. 4 ft. along E. slope.
- 28.30 Ridge, bears NE. and SW.; desc. 78 ft. along broken W. slope.
- 35.50 Descent becomes very steep, changing to NW. slope.
- 37.40 Point for the ¼ sec. cor. of secs. 19 and 24, at proportionate distance; there is no remaining evidence of the original corner.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 12 ins. in the ground to solid rock, and in a mound of stone, 2 ft. base, to top, with brass cap marked
