

County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

Dependent Resurvey of a Portion of the Subdivisional Lines of T. 21 S., R. 8 W.

CHAINS

A fir, 20 ins. diam., bears S. 14° W., 87 lks. dist., marked T21S R8W S14 BT.

A cedar, 50 ins. diam., bears N. 29° W., 95 lks. dist., marked T21S R8W S11 BT.

Land, mountainous. Soil, sandy clay loam. Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, maple, alder, dogwood, and yew. Undergrowth, vine maple, hazel, arrowwood, huckleberry, and salal.

From the cor. of secs. 7, 12, 13, and 18, on the E. bdy. of the Tp., heretofore described.

S. 89° 19' W., bet. secs. 12 and 13.

Descend 170 ft. along steep N. slope, changing to W. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.

3.90 Halfway Creek, 18 lks. wide, course N.; asc. 620 ft. over general E. slope.

30.50 Spur ridge, bears N. and S.; desc. 40 ft. along N. slope.

32.30 Spur, slopes N. 40° W. desc. 360 ft. over W. slope.

40.02 Point for the  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of secs. 12 and 13, at proportionate distance there is no remaining evidence of the original corner.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked

A hemlock, 16 ins. diam., bears N. 39° E., 48 lks. dist., marked  $\frac{1}{4}$  S12 BT.

A cedar, 8 ins. diam., bears S. 39° W., 43 lks. dist., marked  $\frac{1}{4}$  S13 BT.

Descend 10 ft. over W. slope.

40.25 Dry bed of stream, 5 lks. wide, course N. 10° W. asc. 180 ft. over NE. slope.

44.35 Spur, slopes N., desc. 140 ft. over NW. slope.

47.90 Branch, 2 lks. wide, course N. 10° E.; asc. 440 ft. over E. slope.

56.80 Spur ridge, bears N. 30° W. and S. 30° E.; desc. 690 ft. over SW. slope.

78.56 Branch, 4 lks. wide, course N. 10° W.; asc. 70 ft. over E. slope.

80.04 The cor. of secs. 11, 12, 13, and 14.

Land, mountainous. Soil, sandy and rocky clay loam. Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, maple, alder, and dogwood. Undergrowth, vine maple, hazel, arrowwood, huckleberry, and salal.

N. 1°08' E., bet. secs. 11 and 12.

Descend 70 ft. over NE. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.
