Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 4 and 9, at proportionate distance; there is no remaining evidence of the original corner.

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, and in a mound of stone, 2 ft. base, to top, with brass cap mkd.

- 71.38 Spur, slopes S.; desc. 197 ft. over SW. slope.
- 72.18 Leave timber, enter prairie, edge bears N. and S.
- 75.95 Leave prairie, enter timber, edge bears N. and SE.
- 77.68 The cor. of secs. 4, 5, 8, and 9.

Land, mountainous. Soil, clay and rocky clay. Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, madrone, chinquapin, maple, alder, dogwood and yew; undergrowth, Oregon grape, salal, vine maple, rhododendron, hazel, huckleberry and poison oak.

N. $0^\circ 05'$ E., bet. secs. 4 and 5.

Ascend 268 ft. over SE. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.

- 3.05 Leave timber, enter prairie, edge bears NW. and SE.
- 9.25 Leave prairie, enter timber, edge bears SE. and SW.
- 11.85 Top of ascent, slopes E.; desc. 139 ft. over NE. slope.
- 29.36 Ravine, drains E.; asc. 119 ft. over SE. slope.
- 35.95 Top of ascent, slopes E.; desc. 210 ft. over NE. slope.
- 41.76 Creek, 4 lks. wide, course SE.; asc. 51 ft. over SE. slope.
- 42.475 Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 4 and 5, at proportionate distance; there is no remaining evidence of the original corner.
- Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 8 ins. in the ground to bedrock, and in a mound of stone, $3\frac{1}{2}$ ft. base, to top, with brass cap mkd.
