

## County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

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Survey of the Subdivisional Lines of T. 27 $\frac{1}{2}$  S., R. 8 W.

CHAINS

A hemlock, 6 ins. diam., bears S. 29° E., 29 lks. dist.,  
mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S33 BT.

A hemlock, 8 ins. diam., bears S. 52 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° W., 31 lks. dist.,  
mkd. X only at breast height.

From this point the standard  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 33, T. 27 S.,  
R. 8 W., bears N. 89° 19' W., 6.05 chs. dist.

From the same point the  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 33, on the S. bdy. of  
the Tp., bears South, 2.21 chs. dist.

To complete the survey of sec. 32, at 40.00 chs. in departure  
westerly from the closing cor. of secs. 32 and 33, on the N. bdy.  
of sec. 32.

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  ins. diam., 24 ins. in the  
ground, and in a mound of stone, 2 ft. base, to top, with brass  
cap mkd.

A cedar, 22 ins. diam., bears S. 72 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 46 lks. dist.,  
mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S32 BT.

A hemlock, 40 ins. diam., bears S. 36° W., 107 lks. dist.,  
mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S32 BT.

From this point the standard  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 32, T. 27 S.,  
R. 8 W., bears S. 87° 26' W., 7.37 chs. dist.

From the same point the  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 32, on the S. bdy. of  
the Tp., bears South, 2.02 chs. dist.

## GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Township 27 $\frac{1}{2}$  south, range 8 west, is located in western Douglas County, Oregon, about 15 miles west of the city of Roseburg and about 7 miles northwest of the hamlet of Tenmile. The area is reached by way of the Coos Bay Wagon Road, a paved highway, and the Burnt Ridge Road, a graveled logging road. The surveyed land ranges from about 2,000 feet to 3,100 feet in elevation above mean sea level. The township lies on the summit of the Coast Range and drains to the Coos, Coquille and Umpqua Rivers. The area is timbered with excellent stands of old growth fir, hemlock, and cedar timber, with lesser stands of yew, madrone and scattered oak. The undergrowth is medium to dense and consists of young timber, salal, huckleberry, ceanothus, arrowwood, rhododendron, Oregon grape, manzanita, vines, ferns, and wild grasses. The soil is a rocky clay, with some good clay loam on level places and creek bottoms. There are no settlers in the area; water is ample, but the land is too steep for agriculture and is valuable because of the stands of timber. No mineral deposits were noted.

The average of a number of readings taken over the area surveyed gives a value of 19 $\frac{1}{4}$ ° E. for the mean magnetic declination. There is a range of  $\frac{1}{4}$ ° in local attraction.
