CHAINS

A fir, 24 ins. diam., bears S. $46\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ W., 161 lks. dist., mkd:
 $\frac{1}{4}$ S36 BT.

A fir, 36 ins. diam., bears N. 64° W., 35 lks. dist., mkd:
 $\frac{1}{4}$ S36 BT.

N. $0^\circ 04'$ E., beginning new measurement.

Ascend 11 ft. along rolling ridgetop.

6.30 Leave ridge, bears N. 40° W. and S.; descend 135 ft. over NE. slope.

9.80 The head of a ravine, course NE.; descend 45 ft. along broken E. Slope.

14.10 A spur, slopes N. 60° E.; descend 60 ft. over NE. slope, changing to broken E. slope.

20.60 A spur, slopes N. 30° E.; descend 175 ft. over N. slope, changing to NE. slope.

26.50 The head of a ravine, course S. 70° E.; asc. 75 ft. over SE. slope.

29.00 Same ridge, bears N. 40° E. and S. 40° W.; ascend 108 ft. along broken W. slope.

35.23 Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 31 only, at midpoint on the W. bdy. of sec. 31.

38.45 A spur, slopes W.; descend 26 ft. over NW. slope.

40.06 The cor. of secs. 25 and 36, determined at the record bearing and distance from each of the original bearing trees as follows:

A burnt fir stump, 20 ins. diam., bears S. $61\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ W., 87 lks. dist., with blaze consumed.

A burnt fir stump, 20 ins. diam., bears N. $46^\circ 45'$ W., 79 lks. dist., with blaze consumed.

At the cornerpoint

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. diam., 28 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked

A fir, 12 ins. diam., bears S. $53\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ W., 50 lks. dist., marked T19S R8W S36 BT.

A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears N. $39\frac{1}{4}^\circ$ W., 42 lks. dist., marked T19S R8W S25 BT.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, Sandy clay loam.

Timber, fir, maple, hemlock, chinquapin, dogwood, and madrona.

Undergrowth, vine maple, hazel, arrowwood, slickleaf, manzanita, poison oak, salal, and bracken.

N. $0^\circ 29'$ E., along the E. bdy. of sec. 25.

Descend 40 ft. over NW. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.
