CHAINS	Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, madrone, chinquapin, white fir, alder, and pine; undergrowth, young timber, salal, Oregon grape, vine maple, rhododendron, huckleberry, hazel, live oak, poison oak, black raspberry, manzanita, ferns and vines.
	From the cor. of secs. 15, 16, 21 and 22.
	N. 88° 20' W., bet. secs. 16 and 21.
	Descend slightly along N. slope, through heavy timber and moderate undergrowth.
0.50	Creek, 1 lk. wide, course NE.; asc. 80 ft. over NE. slope.
4.90	Draw, drains N. 60° E.; asc. 250 ft. over SE. slope.
11.40	Spur, slopes N. 50° E.; desc. 125 ft. over NW. slope.
16.85	Ravine, drains N. 60° E.; asc. 135 ft. over SE. slope.
20.20	Spur, slopes N. 75° E.; asc. 25 ft. over N. slope.
28.00	Ravine, drains N. 60° E.; asc. 240 ft. over E. slope.
35.10	Spur, slopes N. 60° E.; asc. 10 ft. over N. slope.
36.95	Ravine, drains N. 60° E.; asc. 25 ft. over SE. slope.
37.64	The $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 16 and 21, determined at record bearing and distance from the remaining original bearing tree: A down fir, 25 ins. diam., bears S. 2° W., 48 lks. dist., with illegible scribe marks visible on bark blaze. At the corner point Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd. $\begin{array}{c} \frac{1}{4} \text{ S } 16 \\ \frac{1}{4} \text{ S } 21 \\ \text{T } 31 \text{ S } \text{ R } 8 \text{ W} \\ 1961 \end{array}$ from which A fir, 42 ins. diam., bears N. 69 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° E., 38 lks. dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S16 BT. A fir, 13 ins. diam., bears S. 45° E., 84 lks. dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S21 BT. S. 88° 08' W., beginning new measurement. Ascend 440 ft. over SE. slope, through heavy timber and moderate undergrowth.
11.95	Spur, slopes N. 60° E.; asc. 155 ft. over NE. slope.
23.00	Ravine, drains N. 60° E.; asc. 375 ft. over E. slope.
32.15	Spur, slopes N. 80° E.; asc. 95 ft. over NE. slope.
35.90	Dirt road, to Dutchman Butte Lookout, 20 lks. wide, bears NW. and S.
